Addressing the Impact of Racism and Associated Trauma

The NWMHTTC School Mental Health Team, in partnership with the UW SMART Center and Midwest PBIS Network, released a new collection of resources to support youth in schools and at home. Addressing the Impact of Racism and Associated Trauma is designed for caregivers and educators to use as a resource to help students process feelings and stress associated with racial trauma.



RETURN TO ALASKA (SINCE COVID)

Alaska Workshops: Effective Practices to Support Mental Health in Schools

In Spring 2023, the NWMHTTC School Mental Health Team sent six professionals with expertise in school mental health, crisis behavioral health response, and trauma-focused care on a week-long visit to provide training and technical assistance across Alaska. The team provided one-day workshops in Sitka, Anchorage, and Nome for school and district teams in collaboration with the Alaska Autism Resource Center and the Alaska Special Education Services Agency (SESA). A total of 184 participants attended the three workshops across the state. The team enjoyed the return to Alaska for in-person trainings for the first time since the pandemic.

Brief Intervention for School Clinicians (BRISC) Hybrid Training

In December 2022, the NWMHTTC SMH Team hosted its first hybrid BRISC Intensive Training for the Battle Ground Public Schools counseling staff in Washington State. A second school district, Salem-Keizer School District in Oregon, was trained in January 2023.
